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State of the Order Address
July 9, 1984
JOHN ANDREW CSELLAK
State Master Councilor

Typically, the State of the Order addresses have contained summaries of all the activities the State Master Councilors have attended in the previous year. Instead of doing this, I've decided to prepare a written list of the activities the other officers and I have attended, which will be distributed at the delegate sessions and which I will highlight in my farewell address. This way I can limit this speech to exactly what state the Order of DeMolay in Florida is in.

I sat down a couple of months ago feeling rather disappointed and depressed. I'd just travelled four hours to visit a chapter meeting that had been cancelled, and on the long drive home that night I had little else to think about. I considered an article that might one day appear in a newspaper in Florida. It's dated January 1, the year 2000, and here's how it reads:

" Today, the Order of DeMolay in Florida died. At a very small ceremony at a local Masonic lodge, a former member of the once great Order announced that all DeMolay chapters in the state had ceased to meet and that the last of them had been closed permanently. Few people were there to witness the event. In 1984, the Order of DeMolay in Florida had boasted nearly 4,000 active members in 67 different chapters. When asked why the Order had died, a former member merely said, 'No one cared.'"

Not a very happy thought. The Order of DeMolay in Florida gone for good.

In past years, I've noticed that few people seemed to recognize the fact that our membership was falling sharply, that we were loosing chapters left and right--not only on the State level but on the International level as well. "Everything's fine," everyone seemed to say, but I believe in telling it like it is. Everything isn't fine. Brother Kevin Barker wrote me a letter back in April which summarized the information he had received in reports from the Zone Councilors. The letter really didn't tell me anything I didn't already know, but the way Kevin worded it caught me off guard. Here, in part, is what the letter said:

1. Most chapters are lacking enough power to fill a quorum at a stated meeting.
2. Leadership is lacking to the extent that most chapters have fallen by the wayside in membership, ritual, communications, and chapter activities.
3. Communications have dropped to the level that the few important events that happen on the chapter level are either conflicting or unknown.

Right now in this room tonight are fewer people than there were at Conclave last year. The jurisdiction of Florida, once ranked second in the country in membership rankings, is now ranked 21st.

More importantly, in the past term we have been forced to close four DeMolay chapters without opening a single new chapter. If this rate of decline continues--if we continue to allow DeMolay in Florida to go on this way--by the year 2000 there may be no DeMolay in the state of Florida.

No Conclaves.

No sports or ritual competitions.

No Order of DeMolay to help build good young men into better young men.

And yet, there is a light at the end of the tunnel.

This past year I've travelled this state, visiting chapter meetings, installations, dances and other activities. Holding area meetings and state activities. I've travelled out of this state seeing DeMolay in other jurisdictions. And in the state of Florida, in every single chapter I've seen without exception, I've witnessed a potential which--if taken advantage of--would shoot DeMolay to heights it's never seen before. I've seen enthusiasm, enough to raise this very roof--enough to motivate the members to make every single chapter bigger and stronger than ever, enough to start instituting new chapters instead of closing existing ones. I've seen and heard new ideas, new people, greater plans, all of which can be put together to make DeMolay in this state better and brighter than any of you can imagine.

But we can't just let all this potential lie there--we can't let it all go to waste. Someone must do something with it--but who? Some would say the Executive Officer can do it. Granted, the Executive Officer can do much to change things, and I assure you he has. But contrary to popular belief, an Executive Officer isn't some sort of god that can simply decree that membership will increase and that every chapter will double in size. Some people might say that the State Master Councilor and State Officers can do it. Granted, the State Officers can have a great impact, but as I have said all along, obviously they can't go around to every chapter by themselves and initiate its membership goal for them.

Then who? Who can turn DeMolay in this state around and set it on a course that will lead it to the top?

The answer lies with you. And I mean all of you--DeMolays, Mothers, Sweethearts, Guests, and especially Advisors-- have an integral role to play.. Because all of you--like it or not--have pledged yourselves to the future of our Order. By your very presence here tonight and by the work you've done for DeMolay in the past, you've shown that you're as dedicated to our Order as anyone alive.

You are the key. You are the only thing in this world that can make DeMolay come alive, and grow and prosper. The state can initiate any programs it wants to, but they won't mean a thing without you. Only through you can DeMolay change its course and begin to increase its membership and its number of chapters. There's no other way.

And I'm not talking about making DeMolay "as good as it was in the old days," because those days are gone, and using them as our goals sets an upper limit on what we can do, when in reality no such limit exists. We need to be looking ahead to the future, not back on the past. I've heard so many Senior DeMolays talk about how things were "when they were DeMolays," and I cringe and wince every time I hear that phrase. Personally, I would be perfectly happy if I never ever heard that phrase again, and I don't doubt that every active DeMolay here feels the same way. Old ideas are helpful, but we don't need to dwell on the past because no matter how great DeMolay was back then, no matter how pretty a picture you paint, we-you-can make it even better.

It has been said that there's no such thing as someone who is indispensable. Perhaps you've heard the story of the father who once took his son aside and told him to put his hand in a bucket of water and take it out again. The father then told his son to look at the hole in his hand had left in the water and said to him, "Son, that shows just how indispensable to the world you are." Personally, I think the entire story is ridiculous. We're not working with water. What if the father had used a bucket of cement? And we're working with something even more potentially permanent than cement--the Order of DeMolay--and each of you, from the youngest and newest DeMolay to the most experienced Advisor, is totally indispensable and utterly irreplaceable to the future of our Order. Every single one of you holds the very future of the Order of DeMolay in the palms of your own hands.

This past year I've seen chapters grow from having only one or two members at a meeting to getting 12 to 15 at each meeting--all this due solely to the efforts of one or two members. Admittedly they had to work and work hard, but look at the rewards! This kind of growth can happen with any and every chapter in this state--with your chapter. All it takes is one person, and it can all begin with you.

Right now we have five days before us. These five days can be five of the greatest days Florida DeMolay has ever seen. Or they can go to waste. The information given in the John Bates University classes can be the key with which you can build your chapter like you wouldn't believe. Or it can mean nothing, if you don't go. The ritual and sports competitions can be lots of fun and build brotherhood. Or they can cause dissension and hurt feelings. The delegate sessions and the work done there can mean more to the future of DeMolay in Florida than any of you can realize. Or they can mean absolutely nothing.

What will make the difference? What will determine whether this Conclave goes down on record as the greatest ever--the one that turned DeMolay in this state around--or whether it is remembered as "just another Conclave?" Very simple. You will. You will get out of this Conclave exactly--exactly what you put into it. And the Florida DeMolay Association will get out of this Conclave exactly what you put into it.

Right now I'd like to ask each and every single active DeMolay and every single DeMolay Advisor to rise. Place your right hand over your heart, raise your left hand and remain silent.

"In the presence of God and these Brothers and friends here assembled, I do hereby rededicate myself to every promise and vow I have made in the name of the Order of DeMolay.

I furthermore promise and vow that from this date forward I will strive to work harder than ever before for our Order, realizing that I have the power myself to help make DeMolay greater than ever.

I furthermore and most solemnly promise that I will do all in my power to make the very most out of this Conclave, attending as many activities here which will aid Florida DeMolay as is in my power.

And finally, I do hereby dedicate myself to all things which will make and keep the state of Florida the greatest jurisdiction in the Order of DeMolay."

If you do so promise and vow, say "I do."

My brothers, the vow which you have just taken may represent one of the greatest things ever to happen to the Florida DeMolay Association. We have the potential here these next five days, and with us working together, there's nothing--absolutely nothing-- that we can't do.

MINUTES
OF THE 51st ANNUAL SESSION
TUESDAY, JULY 10, 1984

The official business session of the 51st Annual Conclave of the Florida DeMolay Association was opened on the Initiatory Degree at 9:15 a.m., with the State Master Councilor, John Csellak, in the East, Deputy State Master Councilor, Hal Reed, also in the East, State Senior Councilor, Kevin Barker, in the West, and State Junior Councilor, Harvey Ward, in the South. The Association was then opened on the DeMolay Degree at 9:25 a.m..

Brother Csellak then introduced Dad Art Stauff, State Chapter Dad, Brother Jon Shoemaker, State Master Councilor of The Alabama DeMolay Association, and Dad G. Lawrence Hunt, P.G.M., Executive Officer in Florida.

Brother Csellak then called on Brother Shoemaker, SMC of Alabama, for remarks.

Brother Csellak then called upon Dad Hunt for remarks. Dad Hunt spoke on the importance of making the right decisions on the Constitutional Revisions coming before the delegate session later in the week.

Delegate handbooks were then passed out, and Brother Csellak gave a general explanation of them.

Brother Randy Casey, Co-Chairman of the Credentials Committee was asked for a delegate count. Roll call was given, and the count was:

Brother Ron Thompson, PSMC, Chairman of the State Nominations Committee, read his report as follows:

To the Delegates of the 51st Annual Conclave:

We, the members of the Nominations Committee, would like to make the following report for your approval.

Our Committee has met with each Candidate who is seeking Office, and we have thoroughly scrutinized the qualifications that each claimed to possess. We are happy to report that the following persons are eligible to seek elected office for the 1984-85 Term.

Brother Randy Casey, Co-Chairman of the Credentials Committee, read the following report of the State Credentials Committee:

To the Delegates of the 51st Annual Conclave:

The Credentials Committee has met and the credentials of all delegates have been validated in accordance with Section 6.05 of the Statutes.

This year, at the 51st annual State Conclave for the Jurisdiction of Florida, there are 42 Chapters and 1 Past State Master Councilor registered for a total of 127 Delegate votes. Assuming that all Delegates are present at a Session, the simple majority would be 64 and the 2/3 majority would be 85. This committee would also like to bring to the attention of the State Scribe the typographical error in Section 6.05 of the Statutes regarding the duties of the Credentials Committee. The reference to "Section 3.12" should read "Section 3.12 and 3.13"

The contents of this committee report will have no fiscal or physical impact on this association, as per Section 6.01 of our statutes.

Brother Wes Dowling, Sem-I-No Chapter, moved to adopt the report as read. The motion was seconded and passed by the delegation.

Brother Csellak placed the session into a state of recess at 10:18 a.m..

Brother Csellak called the session out of the state of recess and into labor at 1:30 p.m..

A new delegate count was taken by Brother George Couture, Chairman of the State Credentials Committee, and the count was:

Total Delegate Count:	102
Majority:	52
2/3 Majority:	68

Travel reports of the Elected State Officers were then passed out to the delegation. Brother Alfredo Stieffel, Bahia Chapter, moved to accept the reports. The motion was seconded and passed.

Brother Bill Johnson, State Scribe, read the State Cabinet Committee Report as follows:

To the Delegates of the 51st Annual Conclave:

We the members of the Cabinet committee wish to make the following report.

The State Cabinet Committee is set up to help the State Master Councilor in his duties. Currently this committee is composed of the "duly elected Zone Councilors of the several Zones."

We believe this system is not in the best interests of the Order of DeMolay and the Florida DeMolay Association for the following reasons:

1. Some Zone Councilors are appointed by Zone Directors.
2. Some Zone Councilors are elected by the Zones at various times throughout the year.
3. Several Zones do not have Zone Councilors.
4. Most Zones feel that this position has very little, if any, significance.
5. There is no chain of command between Zone Councilors and the State Master Councilor.
6. There is no uniform job description of this position.
7. There is no communication between Zone Councilors within the State.

For the reasons listed above, this system at present is contradictory, lacks consistency, tends to create confusion, and thus makes this committee inoperative.

With this in mind, this committee would like to make the following recommendations:

1. The Constitutional Revisions Committee create a new committee that would better serve this jurisdiction. In being formed the following recommendations should be met:
 - a. Its members should have a good working relationship with the State Master Councilor.

- b. Its membership should include at least one representative from each Zone.
 - c. The State Master Councilor shall have authority over its members.
 - d. Its members meet certain qualifications before they can be appointed to this committee. These qualifications are as follows:
 - 1. Leadership Correspondence Course
 - 2. Representative DeMolay Award
 - 3. Past or Present Elected Chapter Officer.
 - e. The members have responsibilities and authority in that they report, directly or indirectly, to the State Master Councilor.
 - f. That the name be chosen for the committee that fits its description.
2. That the Constitutional Revisions Committee amend the Constitution and Statutes to meet with the following changes which will affect the State Cabinet Committee:
- a. That its members be chosen by the State Master Councilor and not consist of the Zone Councilors. (If a committee is necessary to unite the Zone Councilors, then one should be formed specifically.)
 - b. That its purpose is to act in an advisory capacity for the State Master Councilor, when needed.

This will help to make communications better on matters such as membership, ritual, communications, and Conclave. Members for this committee could come from the chair of other committees or key people around the State.

It is the opinion of this committee that these changes will improve the administration of this jurisdiction and better the Order of De Molay itself.

Pursuant to Section 6.01 of the Florida DeMolay Statutes, this report has no fiscal or physical impact.

NOMINATIONS AND GENERAL CAUCUS

The General Caucus of the 51st Annual Session of the Florida Demolition Association was called to order at 9:03 p.m. on Tuesday, July 10, 1984, by Brother John Csellak. Brother Ron Thompson, PSMC and Chairman of the State Nominations Committee, read his report which was passed in the morning session.

The State Master Councilor opened the nominations for the honorable office of State Treasurer. Brother Don Wallace, Sarasota Chapter, nominated Brother John Grocke of Gulf Beach Chapter, and Brother Edmund Akers, Orange Park Chapter, nominated Brother Mike Sims of Orange Park Chapter. Both nominations were accepted by the candidates, and the nominations for the office of State Treasurer were closed.

Nominations were then opened for the honorable office of State Senior Councilor. Brother Don Kraft, Hurlbert Chapter, nominated Brother George Miller of Hurlbert Chapter, and Brother David Will, Gainesville Chapter, nominated Brother Tim McMullan of Seminole Chapter. Both nominations were accepted by the candidates, and the nominations for the office of State Senior Councilor were closed.

Nominations were opened for the honorable office of Deputy State Master Councilor. Brother Terry Smith, J. Edwin Larson Chapter, nominated Brother Harvey Ward, Jr. of Gainesville Chapter, and Brother George Couture, Bahia Chapter, nominated Brother Kevin Franke of Manatee County Chapter. Both nominations were accepted by the candidates, and the nominations for the office of Deputy State Master Councilor were closed.

Nominations were then opened for the honorable office of State Master Councilor. Brother Pete Shipley, Highlander Chapter, nominated Brother Mike Davis of Gulf Beach Chapter, Brother John Thomas, Oscar W. Weeks Chapter, nominated Brother Harry "Chip" Bean of Paul Revere Chapter, and Brother Dean Cook, Arlington Chapter, nominated Brother Kevin Barker of Orange Park Chapter. All nominations were accepted by the candidates, and the nominations for the office of State Master Councilor were closed.

Brother Ron Thompson, PSMC, turned the East back over to Brother John Csellak, State Master Councilor, who gave brief guidelines for the General Caucus. Following normal questioning and explanation of Zone Caucus guidelines, the Caucus was recessed by Brother Csellak at 10:35pm.

Brother Harvey Ward, State Junior Councilor and Chairman of the State Athletics Committee, gave the following report on behalf of the State Athletics Committee:

To the Delegates of the 51st Annual Conclave:

We, the members of the 1983-84 State Athletics Committee wish to submit the following recommendations and comments for your approval.

1. We recommend that checkers, backgammon, and ping-pong competitions be implemented at State Conclave on a single-elimination tournament basis (See appendix #1 for sample tournament schedule). Registration for said events should be handled by the State Athletics Committee in conjunction with Conclave check-in. The tournament schedule should also be set up by the State Athletics Committee immediately after registration. Each event should be limited to thirty (30) competitors. There should be a \$1.00 registration fee for each competitor.

The total time involved in competition for each event should be approximately 5 hours for checkers and backgammon and approximately 9 1/2 hours for ping-pong (see appendices 1 and 2). Due to the small amount of space needed for both checkers and backgammon, we should be able to conduct two separate matches for each competition in the same room. Ping-pong should require only one room, for a total of two rooms involved.

There should be a winner's certificate for each event. The materials for these games should be provided by the State Athletics Committee, and the competitions should be overseen by the committee.

The total cost effect of this recommendation would be approximately forty dollars (See Appendix #3).

2. We recommend that some sort of organized athletic competition be implemented at each of the Spring and Fall area meetings (where facilities allow). As there are usually several hours of "dead time" after the completion of registration, something such as inter-zone softball or volleyball competitions should be implemented at each area meeting by, and at the discretion of, the Zone Directors. If said activities are well publicized, they may help to promote attendance at area meetings.

3. We recommend that the 1984-85 State Athletics Committee re-search the feasibility of producing and distributing fliers promoting all State Athletics Programs. If the committee finds this recommendation feasible, they should be responsible for producing and distributing the fliers to each of the member chapters of this Association.

Recommendations 2 and 3, above, carry no immediate fiscal impact; however, depending on the findings of next year's committee, there will probably be a cost for the publishing of the fliers. This cost will vary according to the type of brochure they opt to use.

4. We recommend that inter-chapter indoor soccer competition be implemented on both Zone and State levels in the manner prescribed in section 2.03 of the Florida DeMolay Association. Indoor soccer competition is covered under the Florida DeMolay Association insurance policy. The total cost effect of this recommendation would be approximately \$140.00 (\$125.00 for traveling trophy and \$15.00 for a replacement trophy each year)

In closing, we would like to thank Dad Bill Gallagher, State Athletics Director, members of the Board of Administration, and especially Brother John A. Csellak, State Master Councilor, for the assistance and guidance they have provided this committee over the last year.

Recommendation #1 would require three winner's certificates each year, and to save costs, it would be easier to purchase 50 certificates at a one time cost of approximately \$40.00.

Scribe's note: Appendix #1 was a single elimination competition bracket, and is not printed. A copy has been retained in the Scribe's file in case of future questions.

Brother John Grocke, Gulf Beach Chapter, moved to adopt the report as read. The motion was seconded.

Brother Louis Sparkman, Fellowship Chapter, objected to Recommendation #1, and he offered the following amendment:

"...Each event should be limited to sixty-four (64) competitors..."

The motion was seconded, and the motion passed.

After a lengthy discussion, Brother Kevin Welch, Albert J. Russell Chapter, moved to delete Recommendation #4 in its entirety. The motion was seconded, and division of the house was called. With the addition of seven delegates who arrived late, the new delegate count was 100. Division of the house found the vote to be 54 yea, 46 nay. The motion passed. Brother Grocke's motion was then passed, and the balance of the report was adopted.

Brother "Chip" Bean, Chairman of the State Membership Committee, read the State Membership Committee Report as follows:

To the Delegates of the 51st Annual Conclave:

The State Membership Committee would like to submit the following report and recommendations for your approval:

As of April 30, 1984, the Chapters of the Florida DeMolay Association had initiated 19.83% of their yearly goal. This figure is an increase from 18.28% for the same period last year. At the end of January, 1984 the Jurisdiction of Florida was ranked second in all of DeMolay International. This was largely due to the State Class that was held in honor of the Grand Master of Masons in Florida, Mr. Robert Goldsmith and the Grand Master of DeMolay, "Dad" G. Lawrence Hunt, on January 28, 1984, at the Scottish Rite Temple in Orlando.

Fourty-three were initiated at that class, and approximately three hundred attended the banquet that followed. The State Membership Committee would like to point out that out of the fourty-three that were initiated at that time, only fifteen were properly reported to the ISC Headquarters by the chapters into which they were initiated. It is, therefore, quite possible that, had the other twenty-eight been reported properly, the Jurisdiction of Florida would have been ranked first.

This committee would also like to congratulate those chapters which reached 100% of their goal in 1983; they are as follows:

Gainesville	218%
Bania	150%
F.H. Thompson	143%
J.E. Larson	127%
Orange Park	125%
Hadji	100%
Wesconnett	100%

We feel that the following recommendations will aid this Association in attaining its membership goals in the years to come:

1. The John Bates University class on Membership emphasize the tactic of gaining membership in a one-on-one fashion (see appendix #1).
2. In addition to the John Bates University class on membership there also be a class more specifically dealing with organizing and carrying out a prospect party. (See appendix #2).
3. The State Membership Committee should make a viable effort to work with each of the Zone Directors in the Jurisdiction to plan and execute an effective Zone Prospect Party in each Zone at least once a year. (A revised copy of the portfolio sent to each of the Zone Directors in 1983 is attached at the end of this report.)
4. The State Membership Committee work with the State Master Councilor to plan and execute at least one state membership class during his term of office. Specific suggestions are as follows:
 - a. It should be planned at a time of the year which statistics show is prone to be unusually low in percentage of membership goal attained.
 - b. It should be held at a facility that is large enough to accomodate the size class that is expected, also one that is centrally located within the state.
 - c. Both degrees should be conferred on the same night, and the degrees should be performed by the reigning State Champions.
 - d. The class should honor a dignitary of DeMolay and/or Masonry in Florida.
 - e. If two classes are desired, the second should be patterned similiar to the first, and they should be a minimum of three months apart.
5. Recommendations three, four, and five of this report be stated in their entirety and with no variations of intent in the next year's State Membership Report.
6. The Executive Officer be asked to mail a copy of the monthly ISC Membership statistics to the Membership Committee Chairman.
7. The State Membership Director be asked to mail a copy of the monthly State membership statistics to the State Membership Comittee Chairman.
8. The State award a trophy to the chapter which initiates the highest percentage of its own membership goal for the year.

The cost of this trophy should not exceed \$50.00 per year and the funding should come from the state as a part of its general membership budget.

The SMC should make every attempt to work this trophy into the theme for his term.

9. The State present a certificate to the Zone that reaches the highest percentage of its membership goal for the year.

The cost of this certificate should not exceed \$4.00, and it should come from the state as a part of its general membership budget.

The SMC should make every effort to work this certificate into the theme for his term.

10. The State should present a certificate to the best all-around Zone based on the point system that is used to calculate the winner of the best all-around chapter trophy that is presented each year.

The cost of this certificate should not exceed \$4.00, and it should come from the state as a part of its general membership budget.

The SMC should make every effort to work this certificate into the theme for his term.

There is no financial impact to the recommendations in this report other than that in recommendations 8, 9, and 10.

Each recommendation in this report is fiscally and physically feasible.

It is the opinion of this committee that the most efficient manner in which to obtain new members in DeMolay is through the proper use of prospect (or Rush) parties. If we push this theory, it can not fail.

In closing, we would like to thank all the DeMolays and Advisors who assisted us in our efforts this year, most of all, Brother John Csellak and Dad Gordon Wardell for their patience and assistance.

15.00---Cost of Replacement Trophy
\$140.00---TOTAL COST

The funding for this event will be taken from the registration fees for the ritual competitions.

2. The state increase the minimum number of points to qualify for Phase II Competition in the Flower Talk and Ceremony of Light from 700 to 800 points. This will conserve valuable time at Phase II Competition.
3. The state permit the top four teams in the Initiatory Degree, DeMolay Degree, and Chapter Proficiency to proceed to State Competition in the event that four teams fail to qualify at Phase II. (We firmly believe that this move will help to increase attendance at Conclave.)
4. This committee feels that the State Association, in administering the Competitive Ritual Program, should adhere to the same qualifying rules, without any change, throughout the competitive season for any given year. After Conclave and before Phase I of the following year, changes can be made in the rules.

LET IT BE FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the Florida DeMolay Association respectfully request the Executive Officer of Florida to approve and promote this Constitution.

**Proposed
Constitution
of the
Florida Masonic Youth Council**

Preamble

The Rainbow Girls, DeMolays and Job's Daughters in the state of Florida, with the consent of the Supreme Deputy of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls in Florida, the Executive Officer of the Order of DeMolay in Florida, the Grand Guardian of the International Order of Job's Daughters in Florida and the Grand Master of Masons in Florida, do hereby create an organization to be known as the Florida Masonic Youth Council (hereinafter Council), and establish this Constitution for its governance.

**Article I
Purpose and Powers**

Section 1. The purpose of the Council shall be, not by way of limitation, to promote the Masonic youth organizations within the state of Florida, to encourage and improve relations between these organizations and to sponsor and promote activities for their common good.

Section 2. The Council shall have power and authority to act within the bounds of this Constitution in order to carry out its purpose, but shall have no authority to enter into the affairs of any of the Masonic youth organizations of Florida, nor exercise any control over them.

Section 3. The Supreme Deputy, Executive Officer, Grand Guardian, and Grand Master of Masons in Florida shall, individually or in union, reserve full power of veto over any act or decision of the Council.

**Article II
Membership and Representation**

Section 1. The membership of the Council shall consist of the Junior Past Grand Worthy Advisor, Grand Worthy Advisor, and Grand Worthy Associate Advisor of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls in Florida, as well as one adult Rainbow Advisor designated by the Supreme Deputy; the Junior Past State Master Councilor, State Master Councilor, and Deputy State Master Councilor of the Order of DeMolay in Florida, as well as one adult DeMolay Advisor designated by the Executive Officer; and the Junior Past Grand Bethel Honored Queen, Grand Bethel Honored Queen, and Miss Florida Job's Daughters of the International Order of Job's Daughters in Florida, as well as one adult Job's Daughters Advisor designated by the Grand Guardian.

Section 2. Each member shall have one vote on all matters which come before the Council.

Article III
Officers

Section 1. The Chairman of the Council shall be elected from the membership of the Council by a simple majority vote, and shall serve from the time of his or her election to the election of his or her successor. The Chairman may not be an advisor.

Section 2. The duties of the Chairman shall be to call and preside over all meetings of the Council, to oversee the handling of all correspondence and finances of the Council, to appoint, with the approval of the Council, such other officers and Committees which are deemed necessary and to perform such other duties which naturally pertain to such an office.

Article IV
Adoption and Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution shall go into immediate effect upon the approval of the Supreme Deputy, Executive Officer, Grand Guardian and Grand Master of Masons in Florida.

Section 2. This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the Council.

Brother Dean Martin, Okaloa Chapter, moved to accept the Resolutions and Constitution as read. The motion was seconded and passed.

Brother Scott Olsen, Chairman of the State Knighthood Committee, read the State Knighthood Committee Report as follows:

To the Delegates of the 51st Annual Conclave:

Knighthood is a valuable asset to DeMolay and the State Knighthood Committee would like to make the following recommendations in an effort to strengthen Florida Knighthood.

1. We recommend that the admission age of 16 years be continued.
2. We recommend that the Degree of Ebon be conferred annually at Conclave upon any Sir Knight present who has not yet received it.

This degree is an optional degree which may be conferred in Knighthood, and it takes approximately 20 minutes to confer. At Conclave a room is already secured for an investiture so no extra room would be needed.

3. We recommend that a definite communication system be constructed not only between the priories, but also with the State Knighthood Director and State Knighthood Committee Chairman. This will be under the direction of the State Knighthood Chairman and State Knighthood Director.
4. We would like to report that Beauceant Priory has been formed in Clearwater and is operating under Letters Temporary.
5. We would like to recommend that next year's committee investigate the possibility of a State Knighthood Association.

A State Knighthood Association in Florida could be very beneficial not only to the priories in Florida but to Florida DeMolay as a whole. This would take much planning on the part of the State Knighthood Committee and Knighthood Director. The State Knighthood Association would have to work in conjunction with the Florida DeMolay Association and under the direction of the Executive Officer.

6. We recommend that the State Knighthood Chairman be an active Sir Knight and preferably a PIKC.

The State Knighthood Committee Chairmen needs to be an active Sir Knight so he will have more knowledge of Knighthood and how it operates. A PIKC would be the best choice because of his knighthood knowledge and leadership experience.

In accordance with 6.01 of the Statutes of the Florida DeMolay Association, this committee report has no fiscal or physical impact.

With active work on these recommendations, Knighthood in Florida can flourish and prosper.

Brother Terry Smith, Chairman of the State Public Relations and Publications Committee, then proceeded to read the State Public Relations and Publications Committee Report as follows:

To the Delegates of the 51st Annual Conclave:

The Public Relations and Publications Committee has put a great deal of effort in this report to try to improve Public Relations and Publications throughout the State. A poll concerning the effectiveness of Public Relations and Publications in our Association was sent to many Florida DeMolay Chapters. Even though the return rate of the polls was poor, they revealed that these two areas definitely need improvement both in our Chapters and throughout this State. As a result, the Committee makes the following recommendations:

1. At least one member of each Chapter should become proficient in the Ceremony of Light and/or the Flower Talk. Both of these presentations are very effective in promoting DeMolay ideals to the DeMolays, their parents, Masons, and the general public. This recommendation should be implemented by stressing the importance of these two ceremonies in area meetings and through State mailings.
2. A newsletter should be developed and sent to every DeMolay in our State. It would be entirely different from the Stateline and Pipeline, and it will consist of articles concerning achievements and events about DeMolays and DeMolay Chapters throughout this State. The publication frequency will be bi-monthly and approximately 4000 copies would be printed for each issue. The cost for each publication will range from \$300.00 for a one sided letter to \$380.00 for both sides. The cost per copy would be 15 cents for a one sided letter or 19 cents for a two-sided letter. This cost includes reimbursement for use of a postage permit. The Publications and Public Relations Committee would be in charge of organizing articles and writing the newsletter, and the Chairman of the committee would be the editor. The Director of Computer Operations would be in charge of printing and mailing the newsletter to all DeMolays within the State.

Since it is unfeasible for the Florida DeMolay Association to provide the funds necessary for four thousand copies, next year's committee should look into the possibility of publishing three issues with a circulation of approximately three

hundred copies per issue on a trial basis. The maximum cost would be sixty dollars per issue. It is our intention that after three issues, we will approach the Masonic appendant bodies of Florida to solicit their financial assistance in increasing the circulation to approximately 4000 copies per issue.

3. Both the State Association and local Chapters should submit DeMolay articles to the "Florida Mason," local Lodge Trestle Boards, and local Shrine Temples' Magazines. Local Chapters should especially submit articles to the Blue Lodge Trestle Boards of their sponsoring bodies. Also, starting in 1983 each Shrine Temple was to appoint a DeMolay Relations Chairman to promote DeMolay in the Temple, and this person should be contacted for any desired DeMolay information to be printed in their magazine.
4. An annual State Membership Class should be named in honor of the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Florida or the Grand Master of DeMolay.
5. Each Chapter and the State Association should continue the State Master Councilor's project for supporting the Masonic Home by contributions from the Chapters in our State.
6. A lot of the Masonic Blood Banks in our State are below quantity. DeMolays that are 17 or older should be urged to contribute blood to any one of the various Masonic Organization's Blood Bank Accounts. This gracious act would definitely improve Masonic relations within our local areas.
7. DeMolays should wear clothing with the DeMolay insignia printed on it and also DeMolay buttons when ever possible especially when DeMolay(s) are in the public eye. We recommend that next year's committee look into the possibility of setting up a jewelry and supply booth such as the one at Leadership Conferences.
8. Newspapers, magazines, radio and television should be utilized to the fullest extent possible. An example of this would be a Chapter submitting an article about its Installation Ceremony.
9. We would like to continue the submission of "Initial Report Forms" from each Chapter by the appointed state officers. These should be sent before the Installation of the next Master Councilor of each chapter. Also, the date of the Master Councilor-elect's Installation and a copy of the proposed term plan should be included in the "Initial Report Form."
10. Regular communications should be maintained by the Zone Councilors and Master Councilors with the State Master Councilor so that he and his officers can stay on top of any problems and/or accomplishments which a chapter may encounter. Copies of the various communications should be sent to the Chapter Advisor and/or Zone Director.

11. Each chapter should send a copy of its newsletter to the Chairman of this committee and the SMC. This will provide additional articles for the newsletter in recommendation #2. It will also provide vital information to the State Master Councilor concerning Chapter productivity.
12. Each Zone Director should see that copies of any Zone newsletter(s) are sent to the State Public Relations and Publications Committee Chairman and State Master Councilor. This is another mode of keeping the information flowing to the proper persons.

In conclusion, we feel that all of these recommendations can greatly improve Public Relations and Publications in our State, but every DeMolay must strive to use and implement these recommendations if we are to achieve the maximum return for our labors. Aside from recommendation #2, this report has no fiscal or physical impact, and therefore, is feasible.

Brother Tim McMullan and Brother John Baker gave the State Constitutional Revisions Report as follows:

To the Delegates of the 51st Annual Conclave:

This year the State Constitutional Revisions Committee has worked diligently in an effort to reorganize the Constitution and Statutes into a more concise and more easily understood format. We have found, however, that this process is taking longer than expected and is therefore not totally prepared at this Conclave. There are however several important issues which need to be addressed at this Conclave. They are as follows:

1. We recommend that Article 5, Sect. 1 of the Constitution be amended by:
 - a. Creating the Budget and Finance Committee. (This is to be Committee # 12 in list in Article #5 Section #1 of the Constitution.)
 - b. As suggested by the Policy and Purpose Committee report, we recommend that this committee be dissolved.

- c. As recommended by the State Cabinet Committee we suggest that this committee be dissolved.
 - d. We recommend the creation of an "Executive Committee." (This is to be Committee # 11 in list in Article #5 Section #1 of the Constitution.)
 - e. We recommend the creation of a Guidance Committee. (This is to be Committee # 09 in list in Article #5 Section #1 of the Constitution.)
2. We recommend that Section 1.01 of the Statutes be amended by increasing the dues that each member chapter pays to \$20.00.
 3. We wish to delete section 4.15 of the Statutes.
 4. We recommend that the existing Chapter 5 be deleted in its entirety.
 5. We recommend that the following section be added as Chapter #5 Section #17:

"The Guidance Committee shall be the duly appointed State Master Councilor's Representatives of the several Zones. This committee will function at the will of the State Master Councilor. It shall act in an advisory capacity to relay the suggested needs of the individual Zones and the State in whole.

6. We recommend that Section 6.16 be deleted as it deals with the Policy and Purpose Committee which has previously been deleted.
- 7-a We recommend that Chapter 7 of the Statutes be amended by changing the words "Zone Councilor" to "State Master Councilor's Representative" throughout the entire chapter.
- b. We recommend amending Section 7.03 by changing the words "State Cabinet" to "Guidance".
- c. we recommend a new Section 7.05: "The SMCR's shall be appointed by the State Master Councilor to serve at his will.
8. We suggest that Section 8.02 of the Statutes be amended to read:

"These amendments shall, upon the approval of the Board of Administration and Delegation, take effect upon the close of the Annual Conclave."

9. Recommend that the following section be added as Chapter #5 Section #18 of the Statutes to define the Executive Committee:

The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Chairmen of all the Committees, the Elected State officers, and all Past State Master Councilors who have not reached their majority.

1. The Executive Committee Shall help coordinate activities, help in the unification of this State and act in the capacity of a grievance committee, if the need be.
- 2 The Executive Committee shall pursue the implementation of the recommendations made by the committees and approved by the delegates at the most recently concluded Conclave. The committee shall be chaired by the State Master Councilor and shall meet at his direction. It will recommend to the Executive Officer and the Board of Administration procedures for the implementation of proposals adopted by the delegates at the last annual Conclave.
10. We recommend the following section to be inserted as Chapter #5 Section #16:
 - a. The Budget and Finance Committee shall review the financial status of this Association and report the same to the delegates at the Annual Conclave. Any proposals, including committee recommendations, containing fiscal impact shall be submitted to the committee for its review and recommendation. The expenditures of the Association shall not exceed its income from Conclave to Conclave.
11. Due to the deletion of Chapter 5 from the Statutes, we are amending Chapter 6 to Chapter 5, Chapter 7 to Chapter 6, and Chapter 8 to Chapter 7.

With the exception of recommendation #2, this report has no fiscal or physical impact as per Section 6.01 of the F.D.A. Statutes.

This Committee and its Co-Chairman wish to extend a very sincere thanks to Brother John Baker, who gave of himself to aid us in a very difficult period. His diligence and dedication to the Order and this Association are greatly appreciated.

Constitutional Revisions

Brother Robert Paulson, E.A. Finn Chapter, moved to accept the report as read. Brother Louis Sparkman, Fellowship Chapter, made an amendment to Recommendation #2 to read:

"We recommend a new section shall consist of the state appointed officers in addition to those whom the SMC deems necessary."

The motion was seconded and defeated. Brother Steve Radke, Melbourne Chapter, made the following amendment to Recommendation #7d:

"The number of SMCR's in a Zone shall be at the discretion of the SMC, but shall not exceed one SMCR for every three chapters or fraction thereof in the Zone."

The motion was seconded; after brief discussion the motion and second were withdrawn.

Brother "Chip" Bean, Paul Revere Chapter, made a friendly amendment to Recommendation 10a as follows:

"...The expenditures of this Association shall not exceed ..."

The amendment was accepted by the Chairman. Brother Scott Christmas, Arlington Chapter, made the following friendly amendment:

"The committee shall be chaired ...and shall meet at his discretion."

The amendment was accepted by the chairman.

Delete the letter "a", which makes a subsection of the Recommendation, forming one complete section.

The amendment was accepted by the chairman.

Brother John Shaw, Arthur H. Carter Charter, moved to delete Recommendation #11. After an explanation of the content of this recommendation, Brother Shaw withdrew his motion.

Brother Robert Paulson, E.A. Finn Chapter, moved to adopt the report as amended. The motion was seconded and passed by the delegation.

Brother Mike Soliven, Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, gave the State Jurisprudence Committee Report as follows:

2. That the Chairman of the Board of Administration be requested to sign each committee report to verify that it has met with the Board's approval.

CHARTER

The several Chapters of the Order of DeMolay in Florida are hereby granted authority to form an organization to be styled "The Florida DeMolay Association". This Association shall exist to further the programs and ideals of the Order of DeMolay, to promote the progress and well-being of the Chapters and their members, and to provide a medium for education and communication throughout the Order in Florida; provided, that this Association shall have no authority over the particular chapters within this Jurisdiction; provided further, that this Association shall have the authority to exercise jurisdiction over State Master Councilor's Representatives and other such Officers as now exist, or may in the future be created, by authority of the Executive Officer.

To accomplish these goals, the Florida DeMolay Association shall be authorized to enact such Constitution, Statutes and resolutions as shall not be in conflict with policies or orders of the Executive Officer, and shall have been approved in advance by the Board of Administration.

The "Board of Administration" is hereby created to serve the Florida DeMolay Association, its Officers and Members, in a general advisory capacity. It shall review and approve all legislation to come before the Association, shall have original jurisdiction over any proposition of grievance arising out of the activities of the Florida DeMolay Association, and shall have the authority to construe or dispense with any provision of the Constitution, Statutes, or rules or competition, except for those of the Original Tournament of Champions, when it shall deem such action to be in the best interests of the Order of DeMolay or this Association, and shall perform other such duties as may be enjoined upon it by the Executive Officer. The Board of Administration shall be composed of Advisors of such number and qualification as shall be determined by the Executive Officer, and shall serve at his pleasure.

The "Campaign Supervisory Commission" is hereby created to oversee and regulate the conduct of the election campaigns of this Association. It shall have the power on its own motion to examine the conduct of any candidate, or person acting on behalf of any candidate, during the course of said campaign, to prevent abuses or actions detrimental to the good of the Order or its members, and to take corrective action approved by the Board of Administration or Executive Officer. It shall be composed of Past State Master Councilors of this Association appointed by the Executive Officer, and shall serve at his pleasure.

**Constitution of the
Florida DeMolay Association
(as revised July, 1984)**

**Article I
Name, Purpose, Colors**

Section 1: This organization shall be known as The Florida DeMolay Association, Order of DeMolay (hereinafter, Association).

Section 2: The purposes for which this organization are formed are exclusively educational, religious, and charitable. Not by way of limitation, such purposes shall encompass guidance of DeMolays in their physical, mental, and religious development through specific programs in the fields of physical education, sportsmanship, citizenship, public speaking and the arts, all designed to promote a keen sense of the principles of good citizenship, sportsmanship, respect for parents and fellowman, and to establish and instill a philosophy of life that will sustain the members of each Chapter in the future.

Section 3: The official colors of this Association shall be the royal colors of Purple and Gold.

**Article II
Allegiance and Authority**

Section 1: The Association, its officers, advisors, and the individuals of member chapters of this Association pledge their allegiance to the International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay, its Grand Master, Grand Secretary and the Executive Officer of the Order in the State of Florida.

Section 2: This body is constituted with the power and authority to set forth laws and to set forth standards in inter-Chapter relations; and to levy fees and dues, provided that these measures are in harmony with the International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay and the Charter under which this Association operates.

**Article III
Membership and Representation**

Section 1: The members of this Association shall be all the Chartered Chapters, and those holding Letters Temporary of the Order of DeMolay located in the State of Florida.

Section 2: The members of this Association shall meet annually for the purpose of conducting business, electing officers, holding sports and ritual competition and all other activities provided for in the Statutes of this Association.

Section 3: In order for the delegation of a member chapter to attend and register, the said delegation must be accompanied by a Certified Member of the Advisory Council or a Master Mason, approved by the Deputy Zone Director for each ten (10) DeMolays or fraction thereof in attendance. No Chapter shall be allowed to register its delegation if said Chapter has not paid, in full, all assessments due this Association.

Section 4: Each member Chapter shall be entitled to be represented by three (3) delegates at the Annual Conclave. This Association shall provide by Statute the manner of voting at delegate business sessions.

Article IV Officers

Section 1: The Officers of this Association shall consist of the State Master Councilor, Deputy State Master Councilor, State Senior Councilor, State Junior Councilor, State Scribe, State Treasurer, State Senior Deacon, State Junior Deacon, State Senior Steward, State Junior Steward, State Chaplain, State Marshal, State Orator, State Standard Bearer, State Parliamentarian, Seven State Preceptors, State Committee Chairmen, and all other selected by the State Master Councilor and/or Executive Officer of the State of Florida.

Section 2: The State Master Councilor, Deputy State Master Councilor, State Senior Councilor, State Junior Councilor, and State Treasurer shall be elected during the general business session of the Association, in Conclave assembled each year, and these officers shall serve until their successors are installed.

Section 3(a): The State Scribe shall be appointed by the Board of Administration from a list of two or more nominees submitted to it by the State Master Councilor. The State Scribe shall be appointed at the Annual Staff Meeting of this Association, or as provided by Article IV, Section 5(c). He shall not be eligible to run for an elected office for a period of one year after his appointment.

Section 3(b): The State Scribe shall work with an Advisor who is satisfactory to the Board of Administration. The State Scribe shall obtain three (3) or more bids for the cost of printing the Conclave Proceedings before the registration of said Conclave.

Section 4: All other State Officers shall be filled by appointment by the State Master Councilor. These officers shall serve until the close of the following Conclave.

Section 5(a): No candidate shall be elected to a State Office who would reach the age of 21 years prior to June 1 of the year following his election. No State Officer may attend an out-of-state school or reside outside of the State of Florida during his term of office. Any violation of these provisions shall automatically create a vacancy in the office.

Section 5(b): A vacancy in an appointed State Office may be declared by the State Master Councilor after an evaluation of that State Officer's performance.

Section 5(c): A vacancy in an elected State Office may be declared by the State Master Councilor after an evaluation of the State Officer's performance, and with the approval of the Executive Officer. A vacancy will also occur in the office of State Scribe upon the recommendation and approval of the State Master Councilor to the Board of Administration.

Section 6: In the event of death, resignation, or removal, each State Councilor shall advance to the next highest officer and a State Junior Councilor shall be appointed by the State Master Councilor, subject to the approval of the Executive Officer. Vacancies in all other State Offices shall be filled by appointment of the State Master Councilor.

Section 7: A candidate must state in his letter of intent that he has read and is familiar with the Constitution, Statutes and Charter of this Association.

Article V Committees

Section 1: The following committees shall be considered as standing committees of this Association:

Article VI Amendments

Section 1: The procedure for amending this Constitution is as follows:

(a): It shall be the responsibility of any Florida DeMolay proposing an amendment to this Constitution to provide for the distribution of said proposal to the committee on Constitutional Revisions, Jurisprudence Committee, Elective State Officers, Executive Officer, Board of Administration, and member Chapters of this Association not less than 60

days prior to the opening of Conclave.

(b): The proposed amendment, after the approval of the Jurisprudence Committee and the Board of Administration, shall be presented for consideration on the floor of Conclave. Upon the approval of two-thirds (2/3) of the delegates present and voting, it shall take immediate effect.

Statutes

CHAPTER 1 Revenue

Section 1.01: Each member chapter shall pay as dues on or before the due date of the Annual Report the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to the Florida State DeMolay Association, Inc. In addition, each member, except those holding Letters Temporary issued since the due date of the last Annual Report, shall pay seventy-five cents (\$0.75) Per Capita Dues for each DeMolay in good standing as shown on the most recent Annual Report to the International Supreme Council. All income received by this Association shall be deposited in the Florida DeMolay Association, Inc. Account to be distributed to the proper funds as required herein, or by other competent authority.

Section 1.02: The revenue of this Association shall be derived from the following sources:

- (1) Dues of the Association;
- (2) Per Capita Dues for each active DeMolay as listed in each Member Chapter's Annual Report to the International Supreme Council;
- (3) Registration fees for Annual State Conclave;
- (4) Sale of Items approved by the Executive Officer;
- (5) Gifts and/or bequests from proper sources.

CHAPTER 2 State Conclave

Section 2.01: There shall be ritual competition; athletic competition; State Sweetheart competition; election of State Officers and any other business for the good of the Order or this Association.

Section 2.02: There shall be ritual competition conducted under the direction of the Executive Officer's Personal Representative for Ritual, assisted by the Chairman of the State Ritual Committee. This competition shall be governed by the rules and regulations of the Original Tournament of Champions.

Section 2.03: There shall be athletic competition conducted at State Conclave under the direction of the State Director of Athletics appointed by the Executive Officer assisted by the Chairman of the State Athletics Committee. This competition shall be limited to the winners of the several zones in each category. The State Director of Athletics, appointed by the Executive Officer, shall appoint for each competition referees for each event who shall use the playing rules set by the Athletics Committee.

Section 2.04: There shall be State Sweetheart competition at State Conclave. The rules and regulations as determined by the Executive Officer shall be published in the proceedings of that year's Conclave.

Section 2.05: For the purposes of participation in the activities and/or competitions sanctioned by this Association, any person who has not yet reached the age of 21 years before June 1 of the year of the Conclave shall be entitled to participate as an active DeMolay, and at any subsequent level of competition; provided that they shall not have been certified as an Advisor.

CHAPTER 3 Elections

Section 3.01: Any qualified DeMolay who desires to run for an elective office of this Association shall send a letter of intent to the Executive Officer and Chairman of the Nominations Committee. The letter of intent will be read aloud before the DeMolay delegation by the Nominations Committee Chairman prior to elections.

Section 3.02: All candidates must be residents of the State of Florida for at least six months prior to election, and shall be members in good standing of a member Chapter of this Association. All candidates for elective State Office must possess at the time of filing of their letter of intent, proof of being a Representative DeMolay, a Past Master Councilor and a graduate of the Leadership Correspondence Course, and copies of such proof shall accompany said letter. Only those brothers who submit a letter of intent for the Office of State Treasurer shall be eligible to run for said office. All candidates for the Office of State Treasurer must also have a personal savings account and/or a personal checking account.

Section 3.03: All candidates for the Office of State Master Councilor must be at least 17 years of age and have been a member of this Order for at least two (2) years prior to June 1 of the year of his election.

Section 3.04: A candidate shall not cause any distribution of materials written or oral pertaining to his candidacy before he has submitted his letter of intention to the proper persons (as stated in Chapter 3, Section 3.01).

- He will be authorized to distribute calling cards only. This card will be no larger than the standard DeMolay dues card in overall size, and will contain no information other than the name, address, phone number, titles and/or honors and the title of the office being sought by the candidate. This card will be the only authorized material which may be distributed in his behalf at Conclave or at any other time.
- Section 3.05: No candidate or individual(s) representing a candidate will make statements, either verbal, written or printed, until receipt by the Executive Officer of the candidate's letter of intent.
- Section 3.06: The election of officers of this Association shall take place at the discretion of the State Master Councilor during a regular business session at each Annual State Conclave.
- Section 3.07: No two (2) State Councilors shall be from the same member Chapter of this Association.
- Section 3.08: It being the purpose of the Order of DeMolay to develop leadership and a sense of responsibility among individual members of the Order, officers of this Association shall not succeed themselves.
- Section 3.09: The election of officers shall be in order of rank, the highest being first, the order as provided by this Constitution, by secret ballot of those entitled to vote, as otherwise provided in the Constitution, at each Annual Conclave of this Association. A majority of the ballots cast shall be necessary for a candidate to be elected.
- Section 3.10: Any qualified candidate who is not elected to the office for which he has submitted a letter of intent may be nominated for a lower office from the floor during elections.
- Section 3.11: The ballots for the election of officers shall be prepared by the State Scribe for each Annual Conclave. The ballots shall be distributed to each delegate entitled to vote, prior to the opening of elections, and the ballots shall be cast with the full name of the candidate for the particular office legibly written thereon; ballots shall be folded only once. Blank ballots, illegible ballots and those otherwise deviating from the proper form provided herein shall be tabulated as abstentions.
- Section 3.12: Each member Chapter shall be entitled to be represented by three (3) delegates at the Annual Conclave. Each delegate shall have one vote in all matters brought on the floor of the Conclave, providing he has been certified by his Chapter Advisor and has been registered with the Credentials Committee prior to the opening of Conclave. In the event that less than three (3) delegates from a Chapter are in attendance at Conclave, any or all of the absent delegate votes may be given to a remaining delegate from

that Chapter. In order to accomplish this, the Chapter Advisor must submit written authorization to the Credentials Committee before the opening business session of Conclave.

Section 3.13: Every Past State Master Councilor who has not reached the age of twenty-one (21) years and is properly registered will be entitled to one (1) delegate vote at the Annual Conclave.

Section 3.14: Each Chapter delegation shall elect a delegation chairman, whose name shall be submitted to the Credentials Committee prior to the opening business session of Conclave. During all business sessions, the vote of the delegation shall be announced by the chairman of the delegation with the exception of secret ballots for State Officer elections.

CHAPTER 4 Duties of State Officers

Section 4.01: The State Master Councilor shall be the duly elected head of this Association, and it shall be his duty to perform all duties which naturally pertain to such an office or which may devolve upon him from time to time.

Section 4.02: The State Master Councilor shall preside at the Annual Conclave and work in conjunction with the Board of Administration. He shall also work with the Executive Officer and his Staff in making arrangements of said Conclave.

Section 4.03: The State Master Councilor shall appoint all committee chairmen of this Association, and in consultation with each chairman, appoint the committee members.

Section 4.04: The State Master Councilor shall have an expense account with funds of two thousand dollars (\$2000.00) which shall be used for reasonable expenses incurred in the performance of his, and the other State Officers' duties, with the State Master Councilor's approval.

Section 4.05: The State Master Councilor shall in person, or by Special Deputy, visit each Chapter in this state at least once during his term of office, so far as practicable.

Section 4.06: The State Master Councilor shall report in writing to the Association at each Annual Conclave, all of his Official Acts, whether performed in person or by Special Deputy.

Section 4.07: The Deputy State Master Councilor, State Senior Councilor, State Junior Councilor, State Treasurer, and State Scribe shall represent the State Master Councilor as his special deputies when so ordered.

Section 4.08: The State Treasurer's records shall be subject to an audit conducted by the Executive Officer.

Section 4.09: The Deputy State Master Councilor, State Senior Councilor, State Junior Councilor, State Treasurer, and State Scribe shall assist the State Master Councilor in every way possible in the discharge of his duties.

Section 4.10: The Deputy State Master Councilor, State Senior Councilor, State Junior Councilor, State Treasurer, and State Scribe shall report in writing to this Association at each Annual Conclave, all of their official acts.

Section 4.11: The State Scribe shall record the minutes of the Annual Conclave of this Association and any official State Meeting. He shall then within sixty (60) days have aforesaid minutes, together with the Constitution and Statutes of their latest revision, published together with the rules and regulations of the ritual and sweepstakes competition to be distributed as follows:

1. One copy to each member Chapter of this Association;
2. Copies to the Executive Officer, one copy to each member of the Supreme Council residing in the state, and one copy to any advisor appointed by the Executive Officer in a supervisory capacity, including the Board of Administration;
3. One copy to the State Master Councilor, The Deputy State Master Councilor, State Senior Councilor, State Junior Councilor, and State Treasurer;
4. One copy to the International Supreme Council;
5. One copy to each of the State Committee Chairmen.

Section 4.12: The State Scribe shall under the direction of the State Master Councilor and/or the Association conduct all correspondence of this Association.

Section 4.13: The State Scribe shall keep and maintain a true copy of the Constitution and Statutes of the Florida DeMolay Association. He shall also supply a copy for the Board of Administration and the Executive Officer of Florida.

Section 4.14: The State Treasurer shall make disbursements for this Association with the approval of the Executive Officer. The State Treasurer shall make an itemized report of all transactions in connection with his office at the Annual Conclave.

CHAPTER 5 Committees

Section 5.01: All committees shall be responsible for reporting on the fiscal and physical feasibility of their proposals.

Section 5.02: The duties of the Jurisprudence Committee will be to determine the constitutionality of all motions, resolutions, and proposals presented by the Standing Committees or from the floor of Conclave. The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee shall serve as State Parliamentarian.

Section 5.03: The duties of the Nominations Committee shall be:
(a) to receive and review letters of intent filed by person(s) seeking qualification as (a) candidate(s) for elective State Office; upon completion of the review the Chairman shall notify the prospective candidate of approval or shall notify him of deficiencies therein; such review and notification shall be completed within twenty (20) days after receipt of the letter by the Chairman; a candidate may submit an amended letter of intent which shall also be reviewed as specified herein above;
(b) to, at the time of election, present to the Delegates a list of qualified candidates.

Section 5.04: The Membership Committee shall study and promote an active program for the acquisition of eligible youth in this Jurisdiction.

Section 5.05: The duty of the Credentials Committee shall be to validate the credentials of all delegates to Conclave in accordance with Chapter 3, Section 3.12 of the Statutes. This committee shall be responsible for arranging the seating of said delegates.

Section 5.06: The duty of the Public Relations and Publications Committee shall be to promote the image of DeMolay through programs of public interest and to put the name of DeMolay before the general public. It shall also be the duty of this committee to inform and assist member Chapters in the Annual DeMolay Week Program. This committee shall oversee any publication of this Association and any related programs.

Section 5.07: The Ritual Committee shall promote uniformity in the ritual of the Order of DeMolay throughout this Association, and shall recommend to the Association for approval, procedures for the performance of ritualistic matters not specifically set forth in the Ritual of Secret Work of the Order of DeMolay and methods of receiving, introducing, and acomodating those who are entitled to recognition in all conclaves, meetings, and public ceremonies of the Association.

Section 5.08: The Athletics Committee shall work with the State Sports Director in acquiring qualified officials for all state athletics competition. They shall also review and submit any proposals to the State Master Councilor.

Section 5.09: The duty of the Constitutional Revisions Committee shall be to recommend pertinent and necessary revisions to the Constitution and Statutes.

Section 5.10: The State Master Councilor shall announce the names of the committee chairmen and the state line officers at the last business session of the State Conclave. The names of the Chairmen shall be published in the current proceedings of this Association.

Section 5.11: All committees shall consist of at least five (5) members appointed by the State Master Councilor, the first named members being the Chairmen.

Section 5.12: It shall be the duty of each committee to submit to the State Master Councilor a report upon request. It shall also be the duty of each State Committee Chairman to gather suggestions and recommendations from the member Chapters and combine them with his own ideas and submit them to the State Master Councilor as a tentative agenda 30 days prior to Conclave.

Section 5.13: The final committee reports shall be typewritten and submitted to the State Scribe no later than the beginning of the last business session at each Conclave.

Section 5.14: The State Master Councilor shall have the power to establish additional committees as he deems necessary.

Section 5.15: The Knighthood Committee shall maintain communication between Pories in this Jurisdiction and assist the development of Knighthood. The Knighthood Committee shall also coordinate Knighthood programs with current ISC and Jurisdictional programs.

Section 5.16 The Budget and Finance Committee shall review the financial status of this Association and report the same to the delegates at the Annual Conclave. Any proposals, including committee recommendations, containing fiscal impact shall be submitted to this committee for its review and recommendation. The expenditures of this Association shall not exceed its income from Conclave to Conclave.

Section 5.17 The Guidance Committee shall be the duly appointed State Master Councilor's Representatives of the several Zones. This committee will function at the will of the State Master Councilor. It shall act in an advisory capacity to relay the suggested needs of the individual Zones and the State in whole.

Section 5.18 The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Chairmen of all the Committees, the Elected State Officers, and all Past State Master Councilors who have not yet reached their majority.

Section 5.19 The Executive Committee shall help coordinate activities, help in the unification of this State and act in the capacity of a grievance committee, if the need be.

Section 5.20 The Executive Committee shall pursue the implementation of the recommendations made by the committees and approved by the delegates at the most recently concluded Conclave. The committee shall be chaired by the State Master Councilor and shall meet at his discretion. It will recommend to the Executive Officer and the Board of Administration procedures for the implementation of proposals adopted by the delegates at the last Annual Conclave.

CHAPTER 6

State Master Councilor's Representatives

- Section 6.01: It will be the duty of each State Master Councilor's Representative to promote Florida DeMolay and its communications to the members of this Association.
- Section 6.02: It will be the duty of each State Master Councilor's Representative to provide monthly reports to the State Master Councilor concerning progress and activities of his Chapter and Zone.
- Section 6.03: The State Master Councilor's Representative will be required to attend all meetings of the Guidance Committee of this Association.
- Section 6.04: The State Master Councilor's Representative shall act as Special Deputies when so ordered by the State Master Councilor to serve on his behalf.
- Section 6.05 Each Zone will have one (1) State Master Councilor's Representative for every three chapters or fraction thereof. The State Master Councilor's Representatives shall be appointed by the State Master Councilor to serve at his will.

CHAPTER 7

Amendments

- Section 7.01: These Statutes can be amended by a simple majority vote of the delegation, and amendments may be substituted anytime prior to the first business session of Conclave, and need only be submitted to the delegates of the Chapters in attendance at the Conclave.
- Section 7.02: These amendments shall, upon the approval of the Board of Administration and the delegation, take effect upon the close of the Annual Conclave.

INTERNATIONAL SWEEPSTAKES AWARD
GENERAL RULES

Each year the International Supreme Council rates the various Jurisdictions according to their participation in ISC programs. The plaques that are awarded are symbolic of the best all-round Jurisdictions in the specified categories.

There are four Sweepstakes awards presented annually with one award for each size category. All Jurisdictions are listed in one of four categories, thus each Jurisdiction is competing with those Jurisdictions more nearly its own size.

The four categories are: Small, for up to 500 members; Medium, for 501-2000 members; Medium-Large, for 2001-3500 members; Large, for over 3500 members. The number of members will be based on the Jurisdictional total as of the end of the DeMolay year on December 31.

There is only one International Championship in each competition (if there are no ties), but a weighted grading system is utilized in most of the competitions which gives equal weight to both percentage of performance as well as quantity of effort.

Sweepstakes points will be awarded for points credited in the ten (10) International competitions, consisting of Jurisdictional Membership, Chapter Membership, Blue Honor Key, Representative DeMolay Awards, Past Master Councilor's Meritorious Service Award, Leadership Correspondence Course, ISC Reports, International DeMolay Week, Chapter Publications, and New Chapters.

The Competitions are divided into three areas of importance with points for the first through tenth place as indicated.

Area I (100 to 10 points)
Jurisdictional Membership
Blue Honor Key
Representative DeMolay
PMC-MSA
Leadership Correspondence Course
ISC Reports

Area II (50 to 5 points)
DeMolay Week
Chapter Membership
New Chapters

Sweepstakes Rules, cont.

Area III (30 points)

Chapter Publications

The weighted system of judging is used for any competition where total number is involved, which involves all competition except Chapter Membership, DeMolay Week, ISC Reports, and Chapter Publications.

This weighted system of judging is used for any competition and quantity effort and the lowest resulting score of all the Jurisdictions occupies first place in the contest rankings for the period being figured. A perfect score for the final ranking is 2, which means the Jurisdiction scored first in both the percentage and quantitative categories.

The International Supreme Council publishes several pamphlets that may be of assistance in helping your Chapter and Jurisdiction in winning the Sweepstakes Award.

Each Chapter taking an active part in all ISC programs is the key to success in contributing toward its Jurisdiction in winning the Sweepstakes Award.

STATE SWEETHEART RULES
for
SWEETHEARTS, FEMALE GUESTS & CHAPERONES
GENERAL RULES

Single female guests under 21 will adhere to the State Sweetheart Rules and Dress Code contained herein and abide by the cerfew set by the Executive Officer.

All female guests must abide by the rules of the Executive Officer, Conduct Committee and Sweetheart Committee.

There must be an adult female chaperone (for every three (3) female guests) to attend any Conclave function. Chaperones must be at least 25 years old. NO EXCEPTIONS! Chaperones must room with the Female guests during Conclave.

Chaperones should conform to all rules and regulations, including the dress code.

ALL female guests and their chaperones must be officially registered through an active DeMolay Chapter with the approval of the Advisory Council.

1. In case of problems or questions, contact the State Sweetheart Chairman or Committee ONLY! DO NOT Contact the Hotel Staff!!
2. All Sweethearts must be sponsored by an Active DeMolay Chapter. They must be a Current Chapter Sweetheart. One entry per Chapter will be accepted.
3. Sweetheart Contestants must be between 15-20 as of July 1 of the year they compete and attending a Florida school or be a high school graduate. They must wear name tags at all times and are required to attend the first briefing session.
4. All Sweethearts should exemplify the highest DeMolay ideal of womanhood and conduct themselves in a ladylike manner.
5. Sweetheart Constestants can not be engaged to be married, married, annulled or divorced.
6. Sweetheart Contestants must have their parents' (or guardian's) approval in writing and submitted to the State Sweetheart Chairman before the beginning of Conclave.
7. Each Sweetheart Contestant and her chaperone must be registered and staying at Conclave (in the same room) the entire Session. The Chaperone must know where her Sweetheart is at all times. A Sweetheart Chaperone may not chaperone anyone else. We must adhere to a one-on-one basis.
8. Sweetheart Contestants will be permitted to run no more than twice for State Sweetheart. Any girl who has been State Sweetheart is ineligible to run again.

Sweetheart Rules, cont.

9. A suitable 5 x 7 photo, preferably in color, must be submitted to the State Sweetheart Chairman the first day of Conclave. No other size photo will be accepted, and the photo will not be returned. (Photo with crown and sash will be permitted.)
10. Pictures, cards, brochures, or any other campaign materials WILL NOT be distributed by a Sweetheart or for her by others. Sweethearts or female guests will not campaign in any way for candidates running for DeMolay State Office.
11. Any infraction of these rules by anyone may cause a Sweetheart Contestant to be disqualified from competition.
12. Sweetheart Contestants may not leave the hotel premises without a chaperone and permission slip from a member of the State Sweetheart Committee.
13. No DeMolay will be permitted to enter a Sweetheart's room without having a Sweetheart Committee member present.
14. Sweetheart Contestants are not permitted in the vicinity of the ballot box while DeMolays are voting for State Sweetheart.
15. Each DeMolay will vote for three (3) girls for State Sweetheart, indicating their first, second, and third choice. Each first place vote will receive three (3) points; second place will receive two (2); third place will receive one (1) point. The girl receiving the highest number of points will be the State Sweetheart. There must be three different, eligible Sweetheart names on each ballot.
16. A member of the B.O.A. shall be present at the counting of the votes to assist the Sweetheart Committee.
17. The State Sweetheart can not serve concurrently as a Chapter Sweetheart. She must resign from her Chapter Sweetheart position upon election as State Sweetheart.
18. The State Sweetheart must notify the State Sweetheart Chairman within 15 days of her election who her official Chaperone will be; the Chaperone must meet with the Chairman's approval. The State Sweetheart must be chaperoned at all times!
19. It is the duty of the State Sweetheart to keep the State Sweetheart Chairman informed, at all times, of her activities.
20. Any engraving done on the State Sweetheart trophy and crown box will be paid for immediately by the State Mothers' Club on presentation of a bill to the State Treasurer.
21. The State Sweetheart is responsible for the crown, sash, cape, trophy and trophy box which will be returned to the State Sweetheart Chairman, in the same condition they were received in, at the beginning of Conclave or upon request.
22. State Conclave registration for the outgoing State Sweetheart will be paid by the Florida DeMolay Association. (Contact State Sweetheart Chairman.)

Sweetheart Rules, Cont.

23. If the State Sweetheart marries, becomes engaged to be married, moves out of Florida, or leaves for 30 days, she must resign and return all State paraphernalia. The 1st runner-up will replace her.
24. The State Sweetheart should be willing and able to travel to various parts of Florida to DeMolay activities, and also, to State DeMolay functions when invited!

DRESS CODE

1. Contestants should at all times be dressed in good taste and appropriately for the occasion.
2. Dresses are recommended for most functions. It is understood that at all times bras, panties, slips and nylons will be worn with all dresses.
3. Backless dresses are acceptable--must have bra and slip. Extremely tight clothing, skirts or dresses with high slits or low cut tops are unacceptable! When in doubt, don't wear it!
4. Slacks or dress jeans (not bare midriff or hiphuggers type) may be worn to sports events or special activities. Shorts, (not short shorts) will be permitted only if the occasion warrants (sports, pool parties, etc).
5. Bikini bathing suits (in good taste) may be worn. Robes must be worn over suits to and from pool.
6. Formals will be worn at all formal functions--Formal Introductions, Grand Banquet, or upon the request of the State Sweetheart Committee.
7. Chapter sashes and crown will not be worn at State Conclave. Sashes will be provided. Sashes will not be worn with slacks or shorts.
